




Fig. 1 - Maximum Forward Voltage Drop Characteristics




Fig. 2 - Typical Peak Reverse Current Vs. Reverse Voltage




Fig. 3 - Typical Junction Capacitance Vs. Reverse Voltage




Fig. 4 - Maximum Average Forward Current Vs. Allowable Lead Temperature




Fig. 5 - Maximum Average Forward Dissipation Vs. Average Forward Current






Fig. 6 - Maximum Peak Surge Forward Current Vs. Pulse Duration




