## DESCRIPTION

The MP2108 is a $2 \mathrm{~A}, 740 \mathrm{KHz}$ synchronous buck converter designed for low voltage applications requiring high efficiency. It is capable of providing output voltages as low as 0.9 V , and integrates top and bottom switches to minimize power loss and component count. The 740 KHz switching frequency allows for small filtering components, further reducing the solution size.

The MP2108 includes cycle-by-cycle current limiting and under voltage lockout. Internal power switches, combined with the tiny 10-pin MSOP or $3 \mathrm{~mm} \times 3 \mathrm{~mm}$ QFN packages, provide a solution requiring a minimum of board space. QFN package is recommended if output current is higher than 1.5A.

| 9 | VREF | Internal 2.4V Regulator Bypass. Connect a 10nF capacitor between VREF and SGND to bypass the internal regulator. Do not apply any load to VREF. |
| 10 | RUN | On/Off Control Input. Drive RUN high to turn on the MP2108, drive RUN low to turn the MP2108 off. For automatic startup, connect RUN to VIN via a $100 \mathrm{k} \Omega$ pull-up resistor. |

The MP2108 measures the output voltage through an external resistive voltage divider and compares it to the internal 0.9 V reference to generate the error voltage at COMP. The current-mode regulator uses the voltage at COMP and compares it to the inductor current to regulate the output voltage. The use of current-mode regulation improves transient response and control loop stability.
At the beginning of each cycle, the high-side N -Channel MOSFET is turned on, forcing the inductor current to rise. The current at the drain of the high-side MOSFET is internally measured and converted to a voltage by the current sense amplifier.
That voltage is compared to the error voltage at COMP. When the inductor current rises sufficiently, the PWM comparator turns off the high-side switch and turns on the low-side switch; forcing the inductor current to decrease.

The average inductor current is controlled by the voltage at COMP, which in turn, is controlled by the output voltage. Thus the output voltage controls the inductor current to satisfy the load.
Since the high-side N -Channel MOSFET requires voltage above $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{IN}}$ to drive its gate, a bootstrap capacitor from LX to BST is required to drive the high-side MOSFET gate. When LX is driven low (through the low-side MOSFET), the BST capacitor is internally charged. The voltage at BST is applied to the high-side MOSFET gate to turn it on. Voltage is maintained until the high-side MOSFET is turned off and the low-side MOSFET is turned on, and the cycle repeats. Connect a 10 nF or greater capacitor from BST to SW to drive the high-side MOSFET gate.

## Internal Low-Dropout Regulator

The internal power to the MP2108 is supplied from the input voltage (VIN) through an internal 2.4V low-dropout linear regulator, whose output is VREF. Bypass VREF to SGND with a 10 nF or greater capacitor for proper operation. The internal regulator can not supply more current than is required to operate the MP2108. Therefore, do not apply any external load to VREF.

## Soft-Start

The MP2108 includes a soft-start timer that slowly ramps the output voltage at startup to prevent excessive current at the input.
When power is applied to the MP2108, and RUN is asserted. A $2 \mu \mathrm{~A}$ internal current source charges the external capacitor at SS. As the capacitor charges, the voltage at SS rises. The MP2108 internally limits the feedback threshold voltage at FB to that of the voltage at SS. This forces the output voltage to rise at the same
rate as the voltage at SS, forcing a linear output voltage ramp from OV to the desired regulation voltage during soft-start.
The soft-start period is determined by the equation:

$$
\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{ss}}=0.45 \times \mathrm{C} 5
$$

Where C 5 (in nF ) is the soft-start capacitor from SS to GND, and $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{ss}}$ (in ms ) is the soft-start period. Determine the capacitor required for a given soft-start period by the equation:

$$
\mathrm{C} 5=2.22 \times \mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{SS}}
$$

Use values for C 5 between 10 nF and 22 nF to set the soft-start period between 4 ms and 10 ms .

## Setting the Output Voltage (see Figure 2)

Set the output voltage by selecting the resistive voltage divider ratio. The voltage divider drops the output voltage to the 0.9 V feedback voltage. Use $10 \mathrm{k} \Omega$ for the low-side resistor of the voltage divider. Determine the high-side resistor by the equation:

$$
\mathrm{R} 2=\left(\frac{\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{OUT}}}{0.9 \mathrm{~V}}-1\right) \times \mathrm{R} 1
$$

Where R2 is the high-side resistor, R1 is the low-side resistor and $\mathrm{V}_{\text {OUT }}$ is the output voltage.

## Selecting the Input Capacitor

The input current to the step-down converter is discontinuous, so a capacitor is required to supply the AC current to the step-down converter while maintaining the DC input voltage. A low ESR capacitor is required to keep the noise at the IC to a minimum. Ceramic capacitors are preferred, but tantalum or low ESR electrolytic capacitors are also an option.

The capacitor can be electrolytic, tantalum or ceramic. Because it absorbs the input switching current, it must have an adequate ripple current rating. Use a capacitor with RMS current rating greater than $1 / 2$ of the DC load current.
For stable operation, place the input capacitor as close to the IC as possible. A smaller high quality $0.1 \mu \mathrm{~F}$ ceramic capacitor may be placed closer to the IC with the larger capacitor placed further away.

If using this technique, it is recommended that the larger capacitor be a tantalum or electrolytic type. All ceramic capacitors should be placed close to the IC. For most applications, a $10 \mu \mathrm{~F}$ ceramic capacitor will work.

## Selecting the Output Capacitor

The output capacitor (C2) is required to maintain the DC output voltage. Low ESR capacitors are preferred to keep the output voltage ripple to a minimum. The characteristics of the output capacitor also affect the stability of the regulation control system. Ceramic, tantalum, or low ESR electrolytic capacitors are recommended.
The output voltage ripple is:

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \mathrm{V}_{\text {RIPPLE }}= \\
& \frac{V_{\text {OUT }}}{f_{\mathrm{SW}} \times \mathrm{L}} \times\left(1-\frac{\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{OUT}}}{\mathrm{~V}_{\mathrm{IN}}}\right) \times\left(\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{ESR}}+\frac{1}{8 \times \mathrm{f}_{\mathrm{SW}} \times \mathrm{C} 2}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

Where $\mathrm{V}_{\text {RIPPLE }}$ is the output voltage ripple, $\mathrm{f}_{\text {SW }}$ is the switching frequency, $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{IN}}$ is the input voltage and $\mathrm{R}_{\text {ESR }}$ is the equivalent series resistance of the output capacitors.
Choose an output capacitor to satisfy the output ripple requirements of the design. A $22 \mu \mathrm{~F}$ ceramic capacitor is suitable for most applications.

## Selecting the Inductor

The inductor is required to supply constant current to the output load while being driven by the switched input voltage. A larger value inductor results in less ripple current that in turn results in lower output ripple voltage. However, the larger value inductor is likely to have a larger physical size and higher series resistance. Choose an inductor that does not saturate under the worst-case load conditions. A good rule for determining the inductance is to allow peak-to-peak ripple current to be approximately $30 \%$ to $40 \%$ of the maximum load current. Make sure that the peak inductor current (the load current plus half the peak-topeak inductor ripple current) is below 2.5 A to prevent loss of regulation due to the current limit.

Calculate the required inductance value by the equation:

$$
\mathrm{L}=\frac{\mathrm{V}_{\text {OUT }} \times\left(\mathrm{V}_{\text {IN }}-\mathrm{V}_{\text {OUT }}\right)}{\mathrm{V}_{\text {IN }} \times f_{\text {SW }} \times \Delta \mathrm{I}}
$$

Where $\Delta \mathrm{I}$ is the peak-to-peak inductor ripple current. It is recommended to choose $\Delta l$ to be $30 \% \sim 40 \%$ of the maximum load current.

## Compensation

The system stability is controlled through the COMP pin. COMP is the output of the internal transconductance error amplifier. A series capacitor-resistor combination sets a pole-zero combination to control the characteristics of the control system.

The DC loop gain is:

$$
\mathrm{A}_{\mathrm{VDC}}=\left(\frac{\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{FB}}}{\mathrm{~V}_{\mathrm{OUT}}}\right) \times \mathrm{A}_{\mathrm{VEA}} \times \mathrm{G}_{\mathrm{CS}} \times \mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{LOAD}}
$$

Where $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{FB}}$ is the feedback voltage, 0.9 V , $\mathrm{A}_{\text {VEA }}$ is the transconductance error amplifier voltage gain, $400 \mathrm{~V} / \mathrm{V}$ and $\mathrm{G}_{\mathrm{cs}}$ is the current sense transconductance, (roughly the output current divided by the voltage at COMP), 4.5A/V.
$\mathrm{R}_{\text {LOAD }}$ is the load resistance:

$$
R_{\text {LOAD }}=\frac{V_{\text {OUT }}}{I_{\text {OUT }}}
$$

Where lout is the output load current.
The system has 2 poles of importance, one is due to the compensation capacitor (C3), and the other is due to the load resistance and the output capacitor (C2), where:

$$
f_{P 1}=\frac{G_{\text {EA }}}{2 \pi \times A_{\text {VEA }} \times C 3}
$$

$P 1$ is the first pole, and $G_{E A}$ is the error amplifier transconductance $(450 \mu \mathrm{~A} / \mathrm{V})$ and

$$
f_{P 2}=\frac{1}{2 \pi \times R_{\text {LOAD }} \times C 2}
$$

The system has one zero of importance, due to the compensation capacitor (C3) and the compensation resistor (R3). The zero is:

$$
\mathrm{f}_{\mathrm{Z} 1}=\frac{1}{2 \pi \times \mathrm{R} 3 \times \mathrm{C} 3}
$$

If large value capacitors with relatively high equivalent-series-resistance (ESR) are used, the zero due to the capacitance and ESR of the output capacitor can be compensated by a third pole set by R3 and C4. The pole is:

$$
f_{P 3}=\frac{1}{2 \pi \times R 3 \times C 4}
$$

The system crossover frequency (the frequency where the loop gain drops to 1 dB or 0 dB ) is important. Set the crossover frequency below one tenth of the switching frequency to insure stable operation. Lower crossover frequencies result in slower response and worse transient load recovery. Higher crossover frequencies degrade the phase and/or gain margins and can result in instability.

## Choosing the Compensation Components

The values of the compensation components listed in Table 1 yields a stable control loop for the given output voltage and capacitor. To optimize the compensation components for conditions not listed in Table 1, use the following procedure.

Choose the compensation resistor to set the desired crossover frequency. Determine the value by the following equation:

$$
\mathrm{R} 3=\frac{2 \pi \times \mathrm{C} 2 \times \mathrm{f}_{\mathrm{C}}}{\mathrm{G}_{\mathrm{EA}} \times \mathrm{G}_{\mathrm{CS}}} \times \frac{\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{OUT}}}{\mathrm{~V}_{\mathrm{FB}}}
$$

Where $G_{E A}$ is the EA transconductance $(450 \mu \mathrm{~A} / \mathrm{V})$ and $\mathrm{f}_{\mathrm{c}}$ is the desired crossover frequency (preferably 33 KHz ).
Choose the compensation capacitor to set the zero below one fourth of the crossover frequency. Determine the value by the following equation:

$$
\mathrm{C} 3>\frac{2}{\pi \times \mathrm{R} 3 \times \mathrm{f}_{\mathrm{C}}}
$$

Determine if the second compensation capacitor, C4 is required. It is required if the ESR zero of the output capacitor happens at less than half of the switching frequency or:

$$
\pi \times \mathrm{C} 2 \times \mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{ESR}} \times \mathrm{f}_{\mathrm{SW}}>1
$$

where $R_{\text {ESR }}$ is the equivalent series resistance of the output capacitor.

The second compensation capcacitor is determined by the equation:

$$
\mathrm{C} 4=\frac{\mathrm{C} 2 \times \mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{ESR}(\max )}}{\mathrm{R} 3}
$$

Where $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{ESR}(\mathrm{MAX})}$ is the maximum ESR of the output capacitor.

## External Boost Diode

It is recommended that an external boost diode be added to help improve the regulator efficiency. The diode can be a low cost diode such as an IN4148 or BAT54.
