GENERAL DESCRIPTION


The FSP3129 is a current-mode step-down DC/DC converter that generates up to 2A output current at 400kHz switching frequency. The device can operate with input voltage up to 30V.

FSP3129

Consuming only 6µA in shutdown mode, the FSP3129 is highly efficient with peak efficiency at 95% when in operation. Protection features include cycle-by-cycle current limit, thermal shutdown, and frequency fold back at short circuit.

The FSP3129 is available in SOP8L package and requires very few external devices for operation.

PIN DESCRIPTION

Pin Number	Pin Name	Pin Description				
1	BS	Bootstrap. This pin acts as the positive rail for the high-side switch's gate drive Connect a 10nF between this pin and SW.				
2	IN	put Supply. Bypass this pin to G with a low ESR capacitor. See Input Capacitor in pplication Information section.				
3	SW	Switch Output. Connect this pin to the switching end of the inductor.				
4	G	Ground.				
5	FB	Feedback Input. The voltage at this pin is regulated to 1.222V. Connect to the resistor divider between the output and ground to set output voltage.



FUNCTIONAL DESCROPTION

As seen in the Functional Block Diagram, the FSP3129 is a current mode pulse width modulation (PWM) converter. The converter operates as follows :

A switching cycle starts when the rising edge of the Oscillator clock output causes the High-Side Power Switch to turn on and the Low-Side Power Switch to turn off. With the SW side of the inductor now connected to IN, the inductor current ramps up to store energy in its magnetic field. The inductor current level is measured by the Current Sense Amplifier and added to the Oscillator ramp signal. If the resulting summation is higher than the COMP voltage, the output of the PWM Comparator goes high. When this happens or when Oscillator clock output goes low, the High-Side Power Switch turns off and the Low-Side Power Switch turns on. At this point, the SW side of the inductor swings to a diode voltage below ground, causing the inductor current to decrease and magnetic energy to be transferred to the output. This state continues until the cycle starts again.

The High-Side Power Switch is driven by logic using the BS bootstrap pin as the positive rail. This pin is charged to V_{SW} + 6V when the Low-Side Power Switch turns on.

The COMP voltage is the integration of the error between the FB input and the internal 1.222V reference. If FB is lower than the reference voltage, COMP tends to go higher to increase current to the output. Current limit happens when COMP reaches its maximum clamp value of 2.55V.

The Oscillator normally switches at 400kHz. However, if the FB voltage is less than 0.7V, then the switching frequency decreases until it reaches a minimum of 60kHz at V_{FB} = 0.5 V.

Shutdown Control


The FSP3129 has an enable input EN for turning the IC on or off. When EN is less than 0.7V, the IC is in 6μ A low current shutdown mode and the output is discharged through the Low-Side Power Switch. When EN is higher than 1.3V, the IC is in normal operation mode. EN is internally pulled up with a 2μ A current source and can be left unconnected for always-on operation.

Thermal Shutdown

The FSP3129 automatically turns off when its junction temperature exceeds 160°C.

Output Voltage Setting




Figure 1 Output Voltage Setting

Figure 1 shows the connections for setting the output voltage. Select the proper ratio of the two feedback resistors R_{FB1} and R_{FB2} based on the output voltage. Typically, use RFB2 \approx 10K Ω and determine R_{FB1} from the output voltage:

Inductor Selection

The inductor maintains a continuous current to the output load. This inductor current has a ripple that is dependent on the inductance value: higher inductance reduces the peak-to-peak ripple current. The trade off for high inductance value is the increase in inductor core size and series resistance, and the reduction in current handling capability. In general, select an inductance value L based on ripple current requirement.

$$L = \frac{V_{OUT} \bullet (V_{IN} - V_{OUT})}{V_{IN} f_{SW} I_{OUTMAX} K_{RIPPLE}}$$

where V_{IN} is the input voltage, V_{OUT} is the output voltage, f_{SW} is the switching frequency, I_{OUTMAX} is the maximum output current, and K_{RIPPLE} is the ripple factor. Typically, choose K_{RIPPLE} = 30% to correspond to the peak-to-peak ripple current being 30% of the maximum output current. With this inductor value (Table 1), the peak inductor current is I_{OUT} • (1 + K_{RIPPLE} / 2). Make sure that this peak inductor current is less that the 2.4A current limit. Finally, select the inductor core size so that it does not saturate at 2.4A.

Input Capacitor

FSP3129

The input capacitor needs to be carefully selected to maintain sufficiently low ripple at the supply input of the converter. A low ESR capacitor is highly recommended. Since a large current flows in and out of this capacitor during switching, its ESR also affects efficiency.

The input capacitance needs to be higher than 10μ F. The best choice is the ceramic type, however, low ESR tantalum or electrolytic types may also be used provided that the RMS ripple current rating is higher than 50% of the output current. The input capacitor should be placed close to the IN and G pins of the IC, with shortest possible traces. In the case of tantalum or electrolytic types, they can be further away if a small parallel 0.1μ F ceramic capacitor is placed right next to the IC.

Output Capacitor

The output capacitor also needs to have low ESR to keep low output voltage ripple. The output ripple voltage is:

$$R_{RIPPLE} = L_{OUTMAX} K_{RIPPLE} R_{ESR} + \frac{V_{IN}}{28 f_{SW}^2 LC_{OUT}}$$

where I_{OUTMAX} is the maximum output current, K_{RIPPLE} is the ripple factor, R_{ESR} is the ESR resistance of the output capacitor, f_{SW} is the switching frequency, L is the inductor value, C_{OUT} is the output capacitance.


In the case of ceramic output capacitors, R_{ESR} is very small and does not contribute to the ripple. Therefore, a lower capacitance value can be used for ceramic type, typically choose a capacitance of about 22 μ F.

In the case of tantalum or electrolytic type, the ripple is dominated by R_{ESR} multiplied by the ripple current. In that case, the output capacitor is chosen to have sufficiently low due to ESR, typically choose a capacitor with less than 50m Ω ESR.

Rectifier Diode

Use a Schottky diode as the rectifier to conduct current when the High-Side Power Switch is off. The Schottky diode must have current rating higher than the maximum output current and the reverse voltage rating higher than the maximum input voltage.

Stability Compensation

The feedback system of the IC is stabilized by the components at COMP pin, as shown in Figure 2. The DC loop gain of the system is determined by the following equation:

$$A_{VDC} = \frac{1.222 V}{I_{OUT}} A_{VEA} G_{COMP}$$

The dominant pole P1 is due to C_{COMP}

$$f_{P1} = \frac{G_{EA}}{2\pi A_{VEA} C_{COMP}}$$

The second pole P2 is the output pole:

$$f_{P2} = \frac{I_{OUT}}{2\pi V_{OUT} C_{OUT}}$$

The first zero Z1 is due R_{COMP} and C_{COMP}

$$f_{Z1} = \frac{1}{2\pi R_{COMP} C_{COMP}}$$



And finally, the third pole is due to R_{COMP} and C_{COMP2} (if C_{COMP2} is used):

$$f_{P3} = \frac{1}{2\pi R_{COMP} C_{COMP2}}$$

Follow the following steps to compensate the IC: STEP1. Set the cross over frequency at 1/10 of the switching frequency via R_{COMP} :

$$R_{COMP} = \frac{2\pi V_{OUT} C_{OUT} f_{SW}}{10G_{EA}G_{COMP} 1.222V}$$
$$= 2.3 \times 10^8 V_{OUT} C_{OUT} \qquad (\Omega)$$

but limit R_{COMP} to $15k\Omega$ maximum.

STEP2. Set the zero f_{Z1} at 1/4 of the cross over frequency. If R_{COMP} is less than 15k Ω , the equation for CCOMP is:

$$C_{\text{COMP}} = \frac{1.8 \times 10^{-5}}{R_{\text{COMP}}} \tag{F}$$

If R_{COMP} is limited to 15k Ω , then the actual cross over frequency is 3.4/(V_{OUT}C_{OUT}). Therefore:

$$C_{_{COMP}} = 1.3 \, x 10^{-5} V_{_{OUT}} C_{_{OUT}}$$
 (F)

STEP3. If the output capacitor's ESR is high enough to cause a zero at lower than 4 times the cross over frequency, an additional compensation capacitor C_{COMP2} is required. The condition for using C_{COMP2} is:

$$R_{ESROUT} \geq Min\left(\frac{1.1 \times 10^{-6}}{C_{OUT}}, 0.012 V_{OUT}\right) \quad (\Omega)$$

And the proper value for C_{COMP2} is:

$$C_{\text{COMP 2}} = \frac{C_{\text{OUT}} R_{\text{ESROUT}}}{R_{\text{COMP}}}$$

A small value C_{COMP2} such as 100pF may improve stability against PCB layout parasitic effects.

Table 2 shows some calculated results based on the compensation method above.






Figure 3 shows a sample FSP3129 application circuit generating a 5V/2A output.






Switching Frequency vs. Input Voltage



Efficiency vs. Output Current




Shutdown Supply Current vs. Input Voltage











Load Transient Response





Load Transient Response







